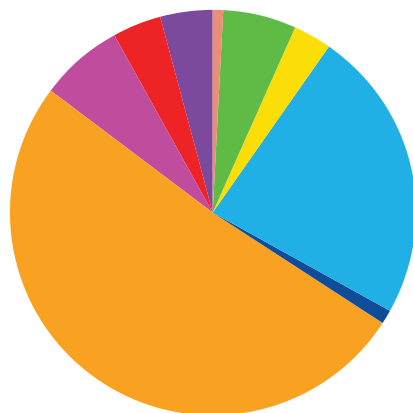

The Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities (AICCU)

is comprised of 78 private nonprofit colleges and universities, which make up the Independent California Colleges and Universities (ICCU) sector. The core mission of these institutions is to improve lives through higher education by honoring a deep commitment to the public good and by embracing diversity. ICCU institutions range from large nationally-ranked research universities to small faith-based colleges. The private nonprofit sector also includes institutions that offer performing and visual arts, and “non-traditional” programs of study, as well as professional schools that specialize in business, law, and medicine. These private nonprofit colleges and universities provide creative and intellectual higher education resources to strengthen California’s future economic vitality while also serving as large employers and community partners within their respective regions. The ICCU sector plays a pivotal role in the development of the state’s model higher education offerings and in making California a symbol of innovation across the globe. Within California, ICCU institutions award over 20% of all undergraduate degrees and over 50% of graduate degrees, making them the largest preparers of California’s advanced workforce.

- ICCU institutions enroll 22% of undergraduate students in California in four-year institutions, nearly 188,800 students.
- ICCU institutions enroll 58%—the majority—of graduate students in California, nearly 165,800 students, making the sector the leader in producing the state’s advanced workforce.
- ICCU institutions enroll over 26,500 Cal Grant students and 49,300 Pell Grant students.
- ICCU institutions proudly serve California and its workforce needs, as 70% of undergraduate students are residents of the state.
